CSU, San Bernardino's Palm Desert Campus offers upper division coursework for this major. Lower division deficiencies should be completed at College of the Desert prior to transfer. Students must complete COD's California State University General Education Certification course pattern to fulfill lower-division general education requirements. Up to 70 semester units of transferable community college coursework may be applied to the degree. NOTE: Students with coursework completed outside of the state of California or at other four-year institutions should make an appointment to see a transfer advisor to determine lower division course equivalencies.

Students seeking to be recommended for a teaching credential (English subject matter program) can use their elective units to take the required coursework specified under #1 in the English Teacher Preparation Program.

**ENGLISH TEACHER PREPARATION PROGRAM
